# **Suspicious Circumstances**

One of the main concepts of the block watch program is *recognizing and reporting suspicious activity*. Sometimes the question, "What is suspicious?" comes up. Let's take a closer look at this block watch principle:

**Recognizing** suspicious activity is as simple as asking yourself, could the vehicle or person(s) I am observing:

- Be about to commit a crime?
- Be in the act of committing a crime?
- Have just committed a crime?

In your neighborhood you can rely on your personal knowledge. Do you recognize the vehicle or person as a resident or frequent visitor to the area? Do you know a house to be vacant? This is where knowing your neighbors pays off. Using personal knowledge of ones surroundings helps you to decide if something is suspicious.

If you see a suspicious vehicle, can you tell if the vehicle is occupied? Do you recognize the vehicle? Does the vehicle appear to be in the area for a purpose, or is it just sitting there? Whether the vehicle is occupied or unoccupied, if you feel suspicious or threatened, you should call the police.

**Reporting** a suspicious circumstance to the police should always be something to consider. Call 911 immediately if you believe that a crime is in progress. If you suspect that you or someone else is in immediate danger, do not hesitate to call 911. This will insure the quickest police response.

The Wauwatosa Police Department's non-emergency number is 414-471-8430. This number is used for incidents which are not "in progress".

Bottom line: never hesitate to call the police should you feel concerned about a suspicious vehicle or person. You should always err on the side of caution. There have been many criminals scared away before the crime, stopped in the act of a crime, or arrested after the crime because a concerned citizen called the police based on suspicion.

# **Thefts from Vehicles**

Please review these tips in an effort to reduce the opportunity of thefts from vehicles:

- Never leave anything of value in your vehicle.
- Remove not only your portable electronic devices but everything related to those items as well, such as cords and mounts.
- Never keep anything of value in plain sight if you must leave it in your vehicle for a period of time.
- Get out of the habit of leaving loose change in your car.
- Always park in a well-lit area. If parking in the driveway at home install sufficient exterior lighting.
- Always lock your car.

Remember, if we take away the opportunity for crime, the criminals will have to go elsewhere.

# Suspicious Person or Vehicle

Suspicious circumstances were discussed earlier in this newsletter, now we'd like to talk about suspicious persons and vehicles.

While the Wauwatosa Police Department is responsible for creating a safe environment for you, it's one's duty to be vigilant and socially responsible as well. It is never a good idea to try to play 'hero' in such situations, instead you should be attentive of your surroundings and make mental notes on suspicious persons or vehicles. You can always help officers by giving a good description of what you see. Train yourself to look for important information.

Make note of the following information on suspicious persons and vehicles. If you believe a crime has occurred, is in progress, or is about to occur, then call the police at 911.

### Suspect Description

- **❖** Sex
- \* Race
- Age
- Height
- Weight
- Complexion
- Hair color
- Eyes/color of eyes
- Glasses
- Clothing : Color of coat/shirt/pants/shoes
- \* Accessories: Hat, bracelet, etc.
- Tattoos
- Scars/Marks
- ❖ Any additional information that may help to locate the suspect.

## Vehicle Description

- Color
- Make
- Model
- License Plate/State
- Direction of Travel
- Any damage to the vehicle
- ❖ Any additional information that may help to locate the vehicle.

Be watchful and careful when recording information on a suspicious person or vehicle, don't find yourself as a victim too.

The Wauwatosa Police Department appreciates the fact that many crimes are prevented due to the input from callers who give good suspect descriptions.

# Communicate With the City

Wauwatosa offers many ways that residents can communicate with all of us who work for the City of Wauwatosa. Go to wauwatosa.net to access these resources:

Online service forms. See a pothole? Want to report a concern about a property? Or not sure where to start? Fill out an online form that goes directly to staff to help you. In the last six months, we've responded to 1,320 online service requests. Find them online: wauwatosa.net/service

Interactive Maps: We have interactive maps available to see safe routes to school and crossing guard locations, a map of reported crimes updated daily, and our new construction map which shows all active construction projects in Wauwatosa including details on the project, its timeline, and who you can contact with questions. ## **Pedestrians & Vehicles Beware**

It was brought to the Wauwatosa Police Departments attention, because of the article in our last Tosa Watch newsletter, that drivers have responsibilities as well as pedestrians when crossing streets.

Many of us have been told that pedestrians *always* have the right of way. While most of the time this is true, there are some exceptions and there are also some tips that you, as a pedestrian, can use to be safe and considerate to the motoring public.

The state of Wisconsin defines a pedestrian as "any person afoot or any person in a wheelchair, either manually or mechanically propelled, or other low-powered, mechanically propelled vehicle designed specifically for use by a physically disabled person, but does not include any person using an electric personal assistive mobility device."

Regarding Right-of-way on crosswalks, the state of Wisconsin states, "The operator of any vehicle shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing the street within any marked or unmarked crosswalk at an intersection except at those intersections where the movement of traffic is being regulated by traffic officers or traffic control signals."

While motorists need to make sure to look for pedestrians as they are approaching crosswalks, pedestrians, conversely, also need to watch for vehicles. While this seems pretty basic, there are people who aren't heeding this advice and are involved in motor vehicle crashes with pedestrians.

One thing that pedestrians need to remember is that just because they have the right of way, doesn't mean that the oncoming motorist will stop. A law written on a piece of paper can't stop a 2,000 pound vehicle. Make eye contact with the driver of the vehicle and make sure that they see you. Make sure that the vehicle is stopped, or at the very least slowing before you step off of the curb.

Pedestrians also have to know that they don't have the right to suddenly step into traffic and make motorists stop for them. Statute 346.24(2) states that, "No pedestrian, bicyclist, or rider of an electric personal assistive mobility device shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk, run, or ride into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is difficult for the operator of the vehicle to yield." If a pedestrian violates this statute it is possible to receive a traffic citation.

One last tip for pedestrians is to be considerate of motorists. Traffic, especially in the Village area, can become very congested. If you see that vehicles are getting backed up, it's not a bad idea to let some traffic go through before you decide to cross. It also may be safer because as we all know some drivers tend to lose patience the longer they have to wait in traffic. This can create poor judgment and bad decisions which will lead to unsafe driving.

If drivers and pedestrians can follow the law and be considerate to one another we can make sure there are no unfortunate tragedies. Let's all be safe out there.

# **Avoid Becoming a Victim**

Just a few tips to keep you and your property safe while out and about

- Walk with authority and always make eye contact with those around you.
- Try to walk with a friend or two.
- Be alert to your surroundings inside and out, avoid tunnel vision.
- Know your route and stay on well-lit paths for night time activities.
- Don't use earphones or ear buds.
- Dress casually and comfortably yet appropriately for your activities and the weather.
- Leave your expensive and even expensive appearing jewelry at home.
- Avoid carrying a purse or handbag if possible.
- Carry important items including your cash in your front pockets.
- Do not flash anything of value.
- Carry a cell phone. Inexpensive ones for just emergency use are available.
- Avoid texting, it distracts you more than you think.
- Only carry the key(s) you need.
- Carry a whistle to help summon help when needed in an emergency.

The Wauwatosa Police Department offers **free** Security Surveys to all Wauwatosa residents and business owners. The survey takes an objective look at your property and its security measures. Officer Dan Kane has been through extensive training in crime prevention, security measures, and safety techniques that can be used to protect one from the criminal element.

Officer Kane will come to your property and inspect the inside and outside of your home or business for security deficiencies. A survey is filled out by the officer on scene which will list the problems observed and give you recommendations as how the problem can be rectified.
