Yard Waste Collection

Beginning April 12, the City will begin yard material collection. Curbside yard waste pickup is completed every other week, alternating with recycling collection. Simply place your yard materials by the curb in a container marked "Yard Waste," paper yard material bags, or bundle with twine and we'll take care of the rest. You can dispose of yard waste in paper bags.

We do not collect:

- grass clippings
- dirt or soil, other than residual from pulled plants
- root balls
- branches over 6 inches in diameter

The Latest Vaccine Updates

Starting April 5, all people ages 16 and older will be eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine. The Wauwatosa Health Department continues to offer vaccination clinics in the Lower Civic Center at City Hall.

To sign up for a vaccine, go to <u>Wauwatosa.net/vaccine</u>. You can select which vaccine brand (Moderna or Johnson & Johnson) to receive when you select your appointment. Second doses are scheduled via email or phone after you receive your 1st dose of the vaccine.

At this time, only individuals 18 years and older can sign up through our clinic because these two vaccines have only been approved for individuals 18 years and older. We have not received supply of the Pfizer vaccine at this time.

Our clinics have only been possible with the help of over 100 volunteers. We are thankful to those who have signed up to help vaccinate our community. Sign up to volunteer through Wisconsin's WEAVR system (www.weavrwi.org) and select Wauwatosa Health Department.

Journey from Ballot to Voter Record

Want to see your voting record? Here's how votes are certified and how to check for it. All ballots, both at the polls and absentee ballots are put into tabulators on Election Day. Poll workers verify all records, looking at the poll books and the results from voting machines. They also seal ballot bags and fill out chain-of-custody forms. Wauwatosa's City Clerk reports these unofficial results to Milwaukee County. Results are official



once a Board of Canvassers certifies these results.

Within 30 days of the election, voter records are put into the state's online system. Our clerks enter Election Day voter registrations and scan the poll books for each person that voted - a reconciliation process that takes place days following an election. Once this is closed, then voter participation records are current and complete. This means that it will take at least 30-45 days after an election for your voter record on myvote-wi.gov to be updated. You can view your past participation in elections at that time.



★ Monitor Your Water Usage with "Eye on Water"

* Wauwatosa Small Business Forgivable Loan Program

Since the pandemic, Wauwatosa has been taking steps to help small businesses in the form of financial assistance or by fast-tracking permits so that businesses can operate safely and creatively. The latest round of financial support is becoming available in mid-April. Small businesses in need of financing during COVID-19 can apply for forgivable loans through the City of Wauwatosa. Loans are forgivable provided that the job creation or retention requirement is met. The application process will open on Friday, April 9 at 12 pm and closes Friday, April 23 at 12 pm.

* Electric Scooters in Wauwatosa

Wauwatosa's Board of Public Works recently approved an agreement with Bird Rides for the company to bring electric scooters to the city. The City is committed to improving transportation access, reducing single-occupancy vehicle use, and providing first- and last-mile solutions to support public transit. The electric scooters can be used on roads, bike lanes, or multi-use trails (such as the one on Menomonee River Parkway). They should not be drive on sidewalks. The scooter company, Bird, also requires users to take a photo of their scooter parked appropriately out of the public's way at the end of their ride.

* Getting Rid of Unwanted Items or Hazardous Waste

The Wauwatosa Drop Off Center is able to help with disposal of many items that we cannot collect curbside. The center is open on Wednesdays and Saturdays, excluding holidays. See what items we collect: wauwatosa.net/recycling

The Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District (MMSD) offers year-round hazardous waste collection for Milwaukee County residents, as well as tips on how to dispose of other items. 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Police Chief Recruitment Process

Wauwatosa is in search for its next Chief of Police. This process, defined by state law, is under the sole direction of the citizen Police and Fire Commission.

The Police and Fire Commission has continued to emphasize the importance of having a public and transparent process for hiring Wauwatosa's next Police Chief. The hiring process is outlined below, as well as the five opportunities for public engagement during the hiring process. You can also follow updates at wauwatosa.net/chief.

Recruitment Steps

- 1. Seek public input through a survey to obtain feedback on leadership competencies. The public will be able to share with the Police and Fire Commission the competencies that are most important in their mind. The survey closed at 11:59 pm on March 12.
- 2. Broadly advertise for this position. This position is posted nationally with the goal of reaching a diverse applicant pool.
- 3. Police and Fire Commission will determine the assessments and screening tools used in hiring with the assistance of a professional human resources consultant team.
- 4. The Wauwatosa Human Resources Department and a Police and Fire Commissioner will screen resumes.
- 5. The Wauwatosa Human Resources Department will meet with the citizen-led Police and Fire Commission to present results of resume screen. The Police and Fire Commissioners will use this feedback to help determine which candidates to invite to the next step.
- 6. Phone screening. Three to five members of the public will be invited to provide feedback to the Police and Fire Commission about candidates participating in the phone screening. The Police and Fire Commissioners will use this feedback to help determine which candidates to invite to the next step.
- 7. Assessment Centers. Nine to twelve members of the public will be invited to provide feed-back to the Police and Fire Commission about candidates participating in three assessment centers. The Police and Fire Commissioners will use this feedback to help determine which candidates to invite to the next step.
- 8. The public will be asked to submit potential questions to be used in a public forum interview for the finalist candidates. These questions will be screened by the Human Resources Department.
- 9. Interviews. Finalist candidates will participate in a public forum in which they will be asked a series of questions (determined from step 8 above). A video of the interview and biographical information of the finalists will available for public review. The Police and Fire Commission will open a survey for the public to provide input. The Police and Fire Commissioners will use this feedback to help determine which candidates to invite to the next step
- 10. Police and Fire Commission will interview final candidates.
- 11. Police and Fire Commission makes a hiring decision.

Construction & Development News



Zoo Interchange - North Avenue and Burleigh

Earlier this year, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation started their work on the North Leg of the Zoo Interchange. The North leg will be under construction for about three years. You can expect overnight freeway closures and other impacts to traffic. Follow their updates: projects.511wi.gov

This 1.7-mile reconstruction project will expand I-41 to eight lanes from Swan Boulevard to Burleigh Street in the City of Wauwatosa. It includes some of the busiest freeway sections

Wauwatosa. It includes some of the busiest freeway sections in the state. The project includes new bridges at Mayfair Road, North Avenue, Meinecke Street and a new bridge for the Union Pacific Railroad. The design also calls for several retaining walls and noise walls along the interstate corridor.



68th Street Paving - Between State Street and Milwaukee Avenue

The entire existing pavement between the curbs will be replaced and a new asphalt surface will be placed. We will fix sections of the storm sewer and sanitary sewer main and also replace street lighting, poles and fixtures. This work is expected to begin later in summer 2021. 68th St. will be closed to traffic.



Ludington Avenue (Between North Avenue and Milwaukee Avenue)

The City of Wauwatosa's contractor will be closing Ludington Avenue between North Avenue and Milwaukee Avenue on Monday, April 5, 2021. The closure is expected to last about 7-8 weeks, depending on weather. The contractor will be replacing concrete pavement, pedestrian ramps, and putting a new layer of asphalt on the road from North Avenue to Milwaukee Avenue.

Fair Housing in Wauwatosa

Fair housing means housing that, among other attributes, is free of unlawful discrimination and accessible as required under civil rights laws. Recently, Wauwatosa collaborated with the cities of Milwaukee and West Allis and the counties of Milwaukee, Jefferson, Ozaukee, Washington and Waukesha in a regional effort to analyze and address barriers to fair housing.

Wauwatosa has taken action to address fair housing by following the passage of a fair housing ordinance in 1968, subsequently updated on several occasions to align with the Federal and State fair housing laws. More recently, Wauwatosa completed a housing study in 2016, implemented an accessory dwelling unit ordinance and updated its Economic Development Investment Policy to address unmet housing needs.

However, there are more barriers affecting fair housing: the lack of a regional housing strategy, restrictive ordinances that limit the types and locations of housing construction, lack of awareness of fair housing laws, disparities in homeownership rates and lending practices, and a fear of others which prevents neighborhoods from welcoming inclusive housing.

This year the Development Department will be undertaking several key projects with an equity focus, including zoning code and housing policy updates to allow for a wider variety of housing options, considering ways to encourage investment in inclusive and affordable housing, and further revising the economic development policy to advance housing access.
