Due to weather, the Civic Celebration Commission decided to delay the Fourth of July fireworks until August 3, 2022 at 9:30 pm. The rain date is August 10, 2022.

Also at Hart Park that night is a Tosa Tonight concert and Tosa Night Out. The Esprit Poms & Dance Squad will perform at 5:30 pm at the Rotary Stage.

Fireworks will be launched at 9:30 pm from 63rd and River Parkway. The best viewing spots are in Hart Park (7300 W Chestnut Street, Wauwatosa). Bring your chair or blanket and sit near the Rotary Stage. Or, find a spot in the bleachers at the track. There are restrooms near the Rotary Stage and near the track.



Common Council Approves Social Worker Position

Too often, law enforcement or fire responders are the first contact for people in need of mental health services. In our current response system, we may send a police officer or fire responder to a person struggling with opioids, a hoarding situation, or individuals with developmental disabilities. These calls for service are singular responses, and a police officer or fire responder may be limited in the resources they can provide.

The new social worker will connect residents to resources such as social service providers and conduct follow-ups with cases and clients. They will help forge deep and dependable relationships among the community, care providers, police, fire, health, and other agencies. This doesn't mean that a social worker would be deployed next to a police officer or paramedic on scene.

"Problems arising from mental health struggles or substance use disorders call for trained medical professionals and social workers who can help identify long-term strategies rather than arrest or incarceration," said Wauwatosa Police Chief James MacGillis.

"Addressing mental health and substance use issues in our community requires collaboration between emergency services and public health. It is our hope that this position will strengthen the response between public health and emergency services to improve health outcomes for individuals living in Wauwatosa. Mental health concerns have been exacerbated by the pandemic, and it is imperative we improve our services to meet the needs of our community," said Wauwatosa Health Officer Laura Stephens.

The social worker's approach can help identify patterns of behavior, create conditions of safety and stability, and work with community partners to prevent crime before it may occur. The position is funded through American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds and not through the general budget.

Even though we lowered our property tax rate this year to its lowest level since 2011, we've been able to take on many new initiatives that will improve life for all Wauwatosans. City Hall has seen a burst of energy. Voters elected eight new Common Council members, including our first two African American alderpersons. Their energy will keep Wauwatosa on a great path. City of Wauwatosa Offers up to 12 Weeks of Paid Parental Leave

Under a new policy, the City of Wauwatosa will provide up to 12 weeks of paid parental leave to employees following the birth of an employee's own child or the placement of a child under 18 years of age with the employee in connection with adoption or foster care.

The City of Wauwatosa recognizes the importance for work/life balance and the need of employees to bond with a newborn, newly adopted, or newly placed child in the home. To be eligible for this benefit, an employee must be a regular full-time or part-time City of Wauwatosa employee. No waiting period or minimum hours worked is required.

"The new, additional leave is flexible to meet the varying challenges that arise when a new child comes into the family," said Beth Mbow, director of human resources. "Our goal is that this benefit will help the city stay competitive and able to attract the best employees to serve Wauwatosa's residents."

Other benefits that the City of Wauwatosa provides include personal and professional development programs, fitness facilities, ongoing wellness initiatives, and a free workplace health clinic.

We anticipate this recommendation to come before the council on August 2, 2022.


"Tosa's Voices" Podcast: Master Electrician's Advice on Permits

Tuesday, August 9 is the Partisan Primary. For every election, we offer absentee voting, inperson absentee voting, and voting on Election Day. Check out myvote.wi.gov to preview your ballot, see your voting location, and more. On Election Day, we also offer curbside voting assistance for people unable to enter the polling place. Stay in your car and call our City Clerk's office (414) 479-8917, and we will send an Election Inspector to you.



What's Accepted at the Drop Off Center?

Are you looking to recycle items such as electronics or dispose bulky items that do not fit in waste bins? The Drop Off Center is a facility located at Public Works that accepts waste and recycling that cannot be regularly put in curbside bins. Items that are accepted at the Drop Off Center for a fee include furniture, mattresses, box springs, carpeting, bricks, dirt, sod, concrete, sand, construction debris, residential yard waste, appliances, electronics, and tires.

Some items, including refuse and construction, have sliding scale fees that are based on the number of items you bring in, which can range from \$8-\$90. Less than one cubic yard is \$8, 1-3 cubic yards is \$20, 3-6 cubic yards is \$30, 6-10 cubic yards is \$50, and 10-18 cubic yards is \$90.

Fees for recycling and scrap metal, and yard waste is \$5 per load, large appliances \$30 each, tires \$5-10 each, and TVs \$30-\$45 each.

You can also purchase a \$20 annual yard waste only permit which is good for one calendar year and allows you to dispose of brush, branches, logs, leaves, and soft plant material.

This permit is only valid for the resident whose driver's license matches the address on the permit. With this permit, you are responsible for putting items in the designated receptacles and not mixing materials.

Construction & Development News



Green Alley Installations

Our green infrastructure strategies capture, infiltrate, and slow the flow of stormwater. We're continuing our practice of installing green alleys to reduce stormwater runoff, help clean and recharge groundwater, and reduce localized flooding. To date, the City of Wauwatosa has installed 25 green alleys, with two more on the way in 2022 on Marion - Grantosa at 99th Street.



2022 Construction on 68th Street

In 2022, we're replacing the pavement on 68th Street from Wisconsin Avenue to River Parkway. This roadway was originally constructed in 1985.

We're also adding dedicated bicycle lanes from Honey Creek Parkway to Aetna Court and shared bicycle lane markings ("sharrows") from Aetna Court to Wisconsin Avenue for both southbound and northbound travel.

Over the next five years, we've paving major arterial roads. These roads are typically wider and have significant and older utilities under the street in need of repair. We are prioritizing roads that impact a larger amount of the traveling public and roads that are eligible for state funding.



Construction on North Avenue from Railroad Bridge to 117th Street

This roadway was constructed in 1958. We are doing a complete reconstruction of the road. North Avenue between 117th and the railroad bridge west of Mayfair Road will be reconstructed by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation as part of the Zoo Interchange north leg. North Avenue entrance/exit ramps at I-41 closed until Fall 2023. If you'd like to receive updates, go to projects.511wi.gov/zoo-interchange-project

New Park and Muellner Building Renovations

The Common Council has allocated four million dollars from American Rescue Plan Act funds through implementation of portions of the Active Tosa Plan. This includes renovations to the Muellner Building and a new city park at 116th and Gilbert Avenue.

This Muellner Building was last renovated in 1999 and is in need of interior and exterior repairs. Exterior needs include work related to tuck pointing, painting, roofing, windows, doors, and fascia. The interior of the building is in need of renovations of the public restroom facilities, flooring, wall finishes, ceiling repair, and lighting throughout the facility.

The Common Council approved \$2 million in funding for this project. This funding would allow the city to address many of the most pressing maintenance needs providing a better experience to users including members of the senior center, residents, renters, and members of the curling club. Our next steps include hiring an architect to finish final design work. This process would include input from stakeholders like the Senior Club and other users of the facility to ensure all needs are understood in the design process.

The second project is a new city park on the southeast corner of 116th & Gilbert. The plan includes walking trails, a sledding hill, a playground (which could be multi-generational), a pavilion, and a mountain bike pump track.

The city has had the opportunity to partner with WisDOT contractors for clean fill and rough grading services related to their work on the interstate. This saves the city significant expenses. Our next steps include hiring a design and engineering firm to develop plans for the park. This process will include a public input that will allow for public participation in the design process.
