Railroad Tracks and Blue Signs

In the past month or so, the Wauwatosa Police Department has responded to two vehicles that have found themselves driving on the railroad tracks. While both incidents can be explained, it's still troublesome to know such things do happen.

With that being said, the police department would like to present information that may increase awareness and educate those who live, work and play in Wauwatosa.

As you approach most railroad tracks, you'll see common things like an "X" labeled railroad crossing, which of course tells one there are railroad tracks near and large white and red arms with lights that flash red when a train is coming. The main thing we'd like to discuss is the blue sign that is affixed at all railroad crossings as this sign is not only posted in Wisconsin, but throughout the entire United States.

If you're unaware of the blue sign, please continue to read as this sign can truly save a life that may be in jeopardy. Whether you find yourself stuck on the railroad tracks or someone else in a dangerous position, possibly driving on the tracks or next to them, the blue sign is the best information one can equip themselves with.



The blue sign will have a phone number and a unique address that consists of six numbers followed by a letter. If you see someone or something on the tracks, call the phone number posted on the blue sign, give the operator that answers the unique address code which is directly related to the Railroad Emergency Notification System as this number gives the railroad your exact location. Instead of calling 9-1-1 and having to wait for the police to contact the railroad, you will immediately be talking with the railroad who in turn will contact the engineer to stop the oncoming train(s). The time you save in minutes by calling the railroad first could very well be enough time for the engineer to stop the train before an accident occurs. Then call 9-1-1 if you need additional help to clear the tracks and don't forget to call the railroad again once the tracks are clear.



Rainbow Fentanyl Is Trending

You may have already seen this information but for those who have not the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) has reported the newest threat in the synthetic opioid crisis.

Rainbow Fentanyl, is being made to look like candy for younger users. It can come in powder or pill form and is 50 times more potent than heroin and 100 times more potent than morphine.



No one wants to believe that this type of activity could happen in Wauwatosa, but it can. Overdoses and overdose deaths happen everywhere to all types of families. There is no discrimination. The best steps anyone can take is to be educated and communicate, no matter how difficult the conversation may be. Take the first step to safeguard your loved ones against possible overdose and even death.

If you happen to see this drug surface in the area, call the Wauwatosa Police Department immediately. Don't touch it or taste it. Keep the drug contained in the packaging it was found in and call 414-471-8430 and ask for Dispatch. We have a quick turn-around time and will be there within a few minutes.

Marked Crosswalks

Have you ever wondered why a crosswalk is marked with diagonal lines? It would seem that many don't as we drive through cities and see people ignore the rules. Let's all get involved and try to spread the word to your children, their friends, family members and even your adult friends. It's too often that we don't stop to let pedestrian cross streets safely.

Throughout Wauwatosa, marked crosswalks exist and it is one's responsibility to know what needs to be done upon approaching such a crosswalk.

Wauwatosa City **Ordinance** 11.20.010 - Right-of-way on crosswalks states: The operator of any vehicle shall yield the right-ofway to a pedestrian crossing the street within any marked or unmarked crosswalk at intersection except at those intersections where the movement of traffic is being regulated by traffic officers or traffic control signals.

Many of us have been driving for years and it's second nature to just stop and let individuals cross, but it doesn't seem to be the norm anymore.

We as pedestrians must make the best decision on crossing or not crossing a street. Don't assume that a driver will stop just because the crosswalk is there. Use common sense and good judgement as we know our bodies can't win against a vehicle hitting us.



Wauwatosa Citizen Academy is Back

Have you ever asked yourself, "I wonder what a police officer does?" The Wauwatosa Police Department can answer your questions and any others that you may have.

Earlier this year, the Wauwatosa Police Department brought back the Citizen Police Academy. This year's class was the first one offered in just over twenty years. The twelve participants had a front row seat to the inner workings of the Police Department over the ten-week program. The class was attended by a combination of citizens, community stakeholders, city employees and city officials.

The citizen academy provides citizens an opportunity to gain knowledge and a better understanding of the vision, values, goals and operations of the Wauwatosa Police Department. The goal of the academy is to enhance collaboration and partnerships between the community and the Police Department.

The Citizen Academy is designed to be interactive. It will include lectures, demonstrations, practical exercises and open discussion provided by members of the Wauwatosa Police Department along with guest speakers. Your evenings will be filled with topics including communications, Special Response Team, Crash Investigations, K9, Criminal/Death Investigations and a tour of our facility. Additional activities will include being fingerprinted and hands-on participation such as; traffic stops, use of force scenarios, OWI (Operating While Intoxicated) enforcement, along with firearms and emergency vehicle operation.

Classes are held at the Wauwatosa Police Department, 1700 N 116 St, Wauwatosa, WI. Each class starts at 6pm and will be approximately three hours long. Participants will be provided credentials, shirt, and all class materials. There is no cost to attend the Citizen Academy.

The Wauwatosa Police Department Citizen Academy is open to adults age 18 and older who live, work, or own property in the City of Wauwatosa. Background checks will be conducted on all applicants. If you have any questions or are interested in attending a future academy class please contact the Community Support Division at 414-471-8430.
