#### POLICY DEVELOPMENT


Advocate for public health, prioritize health needs and plan and develop policies to address health needs.

### Wauwatosa Health Department Overview

According to Wisconsin Statute Chapter 251.02(2), counties with a population greater than 500,000 must establish a local health department (LHD). Therefore, there is no county level health department for Milwaukee County, but rather 12 LHDs that are maintained at the municipal level.

#### Modernization of Public Health - Public Health 3.0

Public Health 3.0 is the term used to describe the modernization of public health goals and missions. It's a progression from focusing on traditional clinical prevention to community-wide prevention, with a strong emphasis on collaborative engagement and actions that directly affect the systematic and unjust factors that contribute to poor health.

The WHD embraces the Public Health 3.0 model and recognizes its necessity in addressing the social determinants of health as well as advancing health equity.

### What is environmental public health?


Environmental health is the branch of public health that focuses on the relationships between people and their environment, promotes human health and well-being, and fosters healthy and safe communities.

### **Radon Test Kit Program**

Radon is a cancer-causing, radioactive gas that you can't see, smell, or taste, but may be in your home. It comes from the natural breakdown of uranium in soil, rock, and water and gets into the air you breathe. Radon has been found in all Wauwatosa zip codes. Testing is the only way to know if there is a radon risk.

The goal of public health nursing is to protect the health and safety of the people in our communities.

Nurses work with individuals, groups, families, and communities, especially those who are at increased risk of illness, injury, premature death, and disability by:

- Taking action to identify and activate resources, services and policies that protect health.
- Responding to current and emerging threats to the public's health and safety.
- Applying nursing and public health principles to assess, develop, implement, and evaluate care
  plans and health programs related to health promotion, disease prevention, and health protection
  services for individuals, families, and the community. (Wisconsin Administrative Code Chapter
  DHS 139)




### **Top Five Communicable Diseases - excludes COVID-19**
