# Wauwatosa Police Department Takes Training Above & Beyond



Keeping a city and its residents, businesses, and visitors safe is not a static process patterns and methods of crime change, there is constant technological innovation, and knowledgeable veterans retire. In order to keep up with the changing world and provide excellent public safety services, police departments around the country need

to innovate and engage in training routinely, and the Wauwatosa Police Department is no exception.

The State of Wisconsin requires a certain level of training for every law enforcement officer in the state. For example, officers must sucessfully complete a minimum of 24 hours of inservice training, pass handgun certification annually, and emergency vehicle certification every other year. In Wauwatosa, we do not stop there. Each Wauwatosa Police Officer actively participates in 20 to 24 hours of training in addition to state requirements. The in-house training covers everything from firearms, defense tactics, vehicle pursuit driving, active-shooter response, and more. The Wauwatosa Police Department also has a number of specialized units, such as the Special Response Team, who train a minimum of 12 hours every month in tactical operations, with the focus being on citizen protection and rescue in a major critical incident.

The Wauwatosa Police Department also collaborates with private entities throughout the city to educate and train them on emergency response situations, including the Wauwatosa School District, the Milwaukee Regional Medical Center, and other businesses.

According to Wauwatosa Police Lt. Brian Zalewski, Director of Personnel and Training, "The end goal of the Wauwatosa Police Department is promoting and protecting the safety of the residents of Wauwatosa, and we are dedicated to that goal. Our emphasis on continual improvement, training, and outside learning ensures that we are up to the task."

# MAYOR'S CORNER Message from Mayor Kathleen Ehley

This summer I was in Madison with City Assessor Shannon Krause testifying to close the "Dark Store" loophole. There seems to be widespread, bipartisan support for these bills - a rarity today. If not corrected, big box retail stores can continue to argue that their properties should be valued for tax purposes at the

same rate as a store that is vacant.

In Wauwatosa, we are facing property tax challenges from major retailers like Nordstrom, Lowes, Menards, Walgreens, and Best Buy. Our city has spent \$440,000 in 2016 alone on legal fees. Why are we fighting the dark store loophole? It shifts the tax burden from larger commercial properties to homeowners and small businesses. If big box retailers win, it could mean about a \$386 tax bill increase annually on the average homeowner in Wauwatosa to maintain the services we have today.

What can you do? Learn more about the "Dark Store" loophole and let your state legislators know your opinion. I stand with the Common Council and city staff asking for commercial properties to pay their fair share and will continue working with state legislators to fight for a fair and equitable assessment practice and a stable tax base.


## **2017 Wauwatosa Photo Contest Winners**

# **★** Leaf Collection begins October 16

Leaf collection will begin on Monday, October 16 and run through Sunday, November 19 - you may rake leaves out to the curb through November 19 at which point the Department of Public Works will make one final pass through the city for collection. You can find a link on the city's website to the leaf collection status map that will show you where we are in the city and how many times we have been through your neighborhood. In 2016 we collected 3,800 tons of leaves. Once they are collected, the leaves are shredded, composted, and ultimately reused to keep them out of landfills.

# ★ Upcoming Community Workshops Hosted by Wauwatosa School District

The Wauwatosa School District invites all community members to attend one of five upcoming Community Workshops in October and November. The workshops are part of the District's commitment to collect broad community input as they plan for the future of education in Wauwatosa. In the interactive workshops the School District will: share the work of the Facilities Advisory Committee, provide a status of School District facilities, and ask participants to help the District prioritize needs. # \* Stay in Your Lane

You may have noticed the new bike lanes painted on North and Wauwatosa Avenues. It can be tempting to use bike and/or parking lanes to pass cars, but doing so is illegal and extremely dangerous to cyclists and people exiting and entering vehicles in the parking lane. A 2012 study showed that dedicated bike lanes dramatically reduce the risk of injury to cyclists on the road - that's a statistic we can all get behind, but it depends on your cooperation to **stay in your lane**. The bottom line is: passing on the right through a designated bike lane is illegal and dangerous.

# **Bublr Bike Station Expansions**

The 2017 - 2019 Wauwatosa Strategic Plan called for the city to add more bike share stations. To advance this initiative, seven new Bublr Bike Stations are being installed at locations throughout the City:

- 64th Street and North Avenue
- Wauwatosa Avenue and Hillcrest Drive
- Harwood Avenue and Milwaukee Avenue
- **Echelon Place**
- Robertson Street and Harwood Avenue
- N 62nd Street near W State Street
- 68th Street and W Wells Street

# **New Playground at Webster Park**



Webster Park, located on the west side of Mayfair Road, north of Capitol Drive, is getting some much needed work done this fall, including a new playground. The playground that is being removed is 21 years old. The project will include new AstroTurf play surface, a new playground, a bike rack, picnic tables, and a new walkway between the parking lot and the playground. The playground should be complete by the end of October and the remaining site improvements by mid-November, weather permitting.

# **Solid Waste Collection Service Map Now Live**



One of the most frequent questions we receive is, "What day is my trash or recycling collection?" Our new solid waste collection service map is a digital resource that will answer this questions, specifically for collection at your home. We have created a mapping service, similar to the leaf collection map that was first used last year.

# Construction & Development News



## **Village Reconstruction Project**

#### 2017 Update & 2018 Plan

Construction will continue through Thanksgiving to rebuild parts of the Village - Wauwatosa Avenue from Harmonee to State Street, Root Common Park, Pocket Park, Harwood from Wauwatosa Avenue to Mower Court, and Underwood from Harmonee to Milwaukee. This is a necessary investment into Wauwatosa's infrastructure - the roadways and utilities underneath them are at the end of their useful life. In 2018 State Street from 68th to 74th Streets is planned for reconstruction, including a new pedestrian crossing at 74th Street.



#### **St. Camillus**

#### **Under Consideration**

St. Camillus has requested a zoning map amendment and related preliminary plans for a planned unit development (PUD) for Phase 2 of their campus expansion. The PUD overlay necessitates City approvals for future improvements. They are proposing an 18 story tower (note that their underlying zoning does not have a building height restriction) that would include 169 new independent living units, underground parking, a wellness center, corporate offices, dining facilities, and more. The Plan Commission recommended approval on September 11. Additional opportunities for public comment are available on Tuesday, October 17 at the public hearing before Common Council about the zoning map amendment and on Tuesday, October 24 at Community Affairs Committee on the preliminary plans and the zoning map amendment.



## **Comprehensive Housing Study & Needs Analysis**

#### **Master Plan under Consideration**

In 2016 a Comprehensive Housing Study and Needs Analysis was completed that identified several key housing issues, including:

- Lack of available and/or affordable housing options for local workforce, lower income families, seniors, and the special needs population.
- Accessibility and deferred maintenance issues associated with an aging housing stock.
- Challenges to the ability of current residents to age in place within the community.
- Limited availability of a mix of housing types.

The Analysis is intended to serve as the basis for a City Housing Policy to address unmet housing needs. Further consideration of a draft plan will be considered by the Community Affairs Committee. As of the newsletter deadline, dates had not been set for the next meeting. Watch the city's website for Community Affairs agendas.
